-- CSAC performed their first out-of-competition drug test on Josh Barnett last week in advance of his August Affliction Trilogy main event with Fedor Emelianenko. The results will be available next week. Barnett was stripped of the UFC Heavyweight Title in 2002 after testing positive for steroids, but has always proclaimed his innocence. He was given 48 hours to take this random test and showed up promptly the next day to give his sample.

-- If you're wondering why they made zero mention of who was "traded" on Raw last night, and you had to go to WWE.com on your own to find out, I just got a report today stating that WWE.com is down 30% from this time last year. So I'd expect more stuff like that.

-- 12 Rounds with John Cena, out today on DVD and Blu Ray

-- There is a new interview with Dixie Carter up here. Not a lot of new information in there. She notes that competing with Raw's success would be foolish, and they are happy to be beating ECW in the ratings.

-- WWE is returning to Mexico on October 16th in Monterrey at the bullring, October 16th in Puebla at the baseball stadium, and Mexico City on the 17th at Palacio de los Deportes.

-- According to Super Luchas magazine, NECRO BUTCHER will be making his Mexico debut on July 18th at an X-Law show at Arena Lopez Mateos. For those who have signed up in the last year or so, we have a Figure Four Daily interview with Necro Butcher from 2007 that you can find in the archives or by clicking this link, which I seem to recall being a pretty great interview. Thanks to Kris Zellner.

-- Wanderlei Silva will be on Off The Record in Canada on Friday. Thanks to Steve Khan.

-- Also, don't forget, tomorrow on Observer Radio Dave Meltzer and I will be joined by BRUNO SAMMARTINO. This is Bruno's second appearance on the show and his first is a must-here. The download link for that one is here.

-- Also, speaking of Sammartino, he was supposed to attend an MMA show in Pittsburgh last weekend but it fell through for reasons we'll discuss tomorrow. Anyway, Phil Davis, whose nickname is "Mr. Wonderful", supposedly beat David Baggett with a CAMEL CLUTCH on that show. It is listed as a rear-naked choke, but if anyone was there who can verify, or better yet if there are photos or videos available, please drop us a line.

-- Pro wrestling six degrees of separation with Michael Jackson: He was being trained by Lou Ferrigno, the former Incredible Hulk, who at one point worked (briefly) for Vince McMahon's WBF. Lou talks about it here.

-- USA delivers their best second quarter ever. Not only their best, but the best second quarter in the history of cable. So much for needing a commercial-free Raw to boost the ratings.

-- Lance Storm has a new Q&A up here.

-- Diane Keaton, 63, was hospitalized with a concussion after she fell down doing a sumo wrestling scene for her upcoming movie Morning Glory. Apparently she's fine now.

-- The Score in Canada will be airing WWE Vintage Collection every Saturday at 7 PM (ET) beginning July 4th, 2009. Thanks to Devin Cutting.
