- Smackdown tonight in Kingston, ONT (Sheamus vs. Alberto Del Rio, Randy Orton vs. Dolph Ziggler)
- TNA from Thursday night in Dalton, GA, Friday night in Atlanta and last night in Gainesville, GA
- K-1 iPPV from the Los Angeles Sports Arena

The big show of the weekend is TNA No Surrender from Orlando:

- Austin Aries vs. The Armbreaker (Drew Hankinson/Luke Gallows) - Really tough to put an unknown in a PPV main event in that kind of a gimmick. Aries is a good wrestler, but he's got to make this work with a huge size difference in a main event caliber match. It will be interesting to say the least.

- Jeff Hardy vs. Samoa Joe in Bound For Glory semifinals

- James Storm vs. Bully Ray in Bound for Glory semifinals

Winners of the semifinals meet for a title shot at Bound for Glory - In theory, the winner faces Aries unless Aries drops the title first. Hardy would be the best draw. Storm is the one the storyline has been built for. Ray and Joe are both better heels if they are looking for the face vs. heel dynamic. I still think Storm is the guy even though he has cooled off. If they don't go with him he becomes just another guy on the roster.

- Christopher Daniels & Kazarian vs. A.J. Styles & Kurt Angle for tag titles - Under normal circumstances, this is a show stealing match. Kurt Angle has said he will wrestle and he will have a great match tonight. Or he's going to kill himself trying. But he's been hurting for a while and wasn't able to work the last two nights after having to cut his match short on Thursday. Still, Styles on his own can carry a match from his side with both guys and make it really good. Still looks like the best match on the show.

- Rob Van Dam vs. Magnus - Just the product of an angle late on Thursday's show to build a match for both guys on the card. Magnus to me should be pushed. He's young, talks really good, and continues to improve as a worker. I hate seeing guys like that just fall by the wayside.

- Zema Ion vs. Sonjay Dutt for X title - These two have been getting good reviews the last two nights for their house show matches. Dutt looked great when he returned in the X division tournament. If the crowd gives them a chance, they've got a shot at a show stealer.

- Miss Tessmacher vs. Tara for Knockouts title - They have a storyline. Since Tara won the non-title and the story is Tessmacher has to prove she can beat her teacher, it makes sense for her to go over here. Up to Tara to carry the match because on PPV you've probably got to go a lot longer than a 3:00 TV bout.

On paper, it really comes down to the BFG series and the main event. The main event is important in a lot of ways, because if this Aces and 8s thing in the first big match isn't good, it's going to give a negative vibe to the angle. One figures it ends with a lot of interference. Between the start of football season, the fact the card wasn't announced on TV until Thursday, and a main event that on paper is going to be a tough one to draw with, I think not much for business here.

We'll have live coverage of the show on the site at 8 p.m.

Fuel will be airing the Forrest Griffin special again at 9 p.m. tonight as well as a Legends Roundtable show at 10:30 p.m. and Cain Velasquez vs. Junior Dos Santos I at 1 a.m. All times are Eastern.

Raw is live Monday in Montreal. The big hook is that Bret Hart returns to Montreal's Belle Centre for the first time as a performer in nearly 15 years, since the legendary 1997 screw-job match with Shawn Michaels. In addition, it is being locally advertised as Pat Patterson Appreciation Night, although it is possible if not most likely those festivities will not be on television.

Smackdown will be taped in Ottawa on Tuesday.

THIS WEEK'S OBSERVER: HALL OF FAME BALLOT. NEW JAPAN WRESTLING IN FOCUS

--As noted above, Kurt Angle has been tweeting that he's wrestling tonight and while injured, he's still going to have a great match. --A quick note as we're looking to hear from anyone who attended the K-1 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena. Wondering if it drew and how well the show came across live. --As of yesterday, and obviously this can change, the Pat Patterson stuff in Montreal is scheduled to be dark. The Bret Hart stuff is scheduled to be along with C.M. Punk & Paul Heyman and whatever is done with John Cena to be the focal points of the show. In Montreal, the show has been promoted as Pat Patterson Appreciation Night. Patterson, who is from Montreal, has been affiliated with WWE since the late 70s and his run with Bob Backlund for the title, and has worked as an announcer, booker, agent, head of talent relations and all kinds of jobs. He's the guy who came up with the Royal Rumble concept after being involved in Roy Shire Battle Royals in the 60s and 70s and is regarded as one of the greatest at coming up with finishes in the history of wrestling.
