Smackdown will be taped in Ottawa on Tuesday.

INSIDE THE OBSERVER: 2012 HOF Ballot, New Japan Examined

We look at how New Japan got into the NWA, its ties with the 70s WWWF as well as why they were at times, and not at others, able to get the WWWF champion to defend.

We look at the early 80s peak, business problems, the Tokyo Dome sellout era and Antonio Inoki's mentality that built the company, and later nearly killed it. We look at the downfall in the last decade, and the turnaround. We look at how the Japanese industry is so much different than the U.S. based on technology, as well as the company's talent mix and why it leads to entertaining major events.

discussing a possible pay service ala HBO, basically the stuff we wrote about months ago. WWE wouldn't confirm that is the plan. We've been hearing a lot of different potential ideas over the last week and there has been talk that an official direction would be revealed shortly.

--The Pittsburgh Steelers vs. Denver Broncos game last night on NBC did a 17.9 rating. Not sure what that means in regard to competition for TNA since TNA draws such limited numbers to begin with and they didn't do a very good job of promoting last night's show.

--Tonight is also the first Monday Night Football on ESPN so Raw is going to be hurt a little. That may play into using Bret Hart and ending last week's show with the Punk/Heyman cliff hanger.

--A note from last night's TNA report on the "World tag team champions of the world" line they are using for Christopher Daniels & Kazarian. It was actually a tag line made up by Daniels, which they told Christy Hemme to use the last several weeks. When Hemme used it the first time, Taz made fun of her like she screwed up so I figured they took it from that, but that wasn't its origin.

, who is being honored tonight in Montreal. Patterson talked about his start in wrestling and why he was unhappy when he first got a role working in the office. He also noted that he pushed very hard for Bret Hart and Shawn Michaels to get their shots in the 90s. He said they've told him nothing about what is happening tonight. He doesn't know if it's on TV and if it is, ahead of time, that he usually cries at things like this. "It's going to be a very touching night for me as I will look back at 54 years in the business, this business I loved and still do today."

--UFC's Kyle Kingsbury was in a motorcycle accident recently and scraped up his hip. He will still be fighting on 9/29 in Nottingham, England against Jimi Manuwa.

--NWA Hollywood Championship Wrestling is no longer part of the NWA and is now going by the name Championship Wrestling from Hollywood. They had a TV taping last night where promoter Dave Marquez made the announcement. Obviously this has to do with the NWA changing from being run by Bob Trobich and company to the new organization formed by Bruce Tharpe out of Texas. Marquez was a power broker in the old group.

taken from an interview for the Unauthorized ECW Documentary. They are trying to get funding for the documentary through Kickstarter.com (search for ECW). With nine days left for funding, they are at 62% (\$14,512 out of the goal of \$23,200) with 278 backers so far. These guys have

been working on-and-off on the project for more than a decade and I'll just say I really enjoyed the interview I did with them a few months back.

--A number of historical big names are celebrating birthdays today. John Walker aka Mr. Wrestling II, who is the subject of a piece on this web site about his credentials for the Hall of Fame, turns 78 today. Don Muraco turns 63. FCW president Steve Keirn turns 61. Matt Morgan turns 36 and Bill Mueller (Trevor Murdoch) turns 32.

--Gabe Sapolsky noted a few things coming off the Evolve iPPV show on Saturday in Voorhees, NJ. He raved about the Samuray del Sol vs. El Generico main event and how Ricochet vs. AR Fox just need to get better at crowd interaction and they'll be top guys. He also said they were surprised at the reaction when Jon Davis turned heel on Johnny Gargano. Sami Callihan came out of the match with Masada with a chipped tooth and his ribs were messed up. He was vomiting in the back and short of breath but was okay and actually worked for CZW later that night, although he was limited in what he could do. Scott Reed's face was swollen the next day and Player Uno had his shoulder pop. Sapolsky noted that they would be announcing the locations of the next Dragon Gate USA U.S. tour in early November with all three shows in the Northeast.
