Today is also AAA's Hero Inmortales, the next to last major show of the year, from San Luis Potosi.

On Fuel tonight is Ultimate Fighter at 9 p.m. and again at 10 p.m. with the last two week's episodes, and a replay of the FX show from Friday night at 11 p.m..

Monday has Raw from Sacramento with the return to television of Vince McMahon as well as John Cena appearing on the show, with more on Punk/Ryback, Punk/Cena Hell in a Cell storyline and the continuation of the tag team tournament.

Monday also has a head-to-head showdown in Japan as New Japan has a PPV show from Sumo Hall in Tokyo headlined by Hiroshi Tanahashi vs. Minoru Suzuki for the IWGP heavyweight title. Pro Wrestling NOAH has its big show at the Yokohama Prefectural Gym headlined by Takeshi Morishima vs. Jun Akiyama for the GHC heavyweight title, Samoa Joe & Magnus vs. KENTA & Maybach Taniguchi for the GHC tag titles, plus a NOAH vs. Zero-One feud series of matches.

Tuesday is Smackdown and Main Event tapings in San Jose. Randy Orton vs. Big Show will be the taped main event for Main Event.

Both WWE and UFC set record low ratings this past week for their flagship television shows.
