We're looking for your thoughts on tonight's TNA PPV, so you can leave a thumbs up, thumbs down or thumbs in the middle along with a best and worst match to dave@wrestlingobserver.com We're also looking for reports on today's WWE Raw house show in Oklahoma City (Miz vs. John Cena vs. Randy Orton; Jim Ross guest ring announcer) and Moline (Edge & Christian vs. Alberto Del Rio & Cody Rhodes), as well as last night's Raw show in Wichita, Smackdown in Cedar Rapids and TNA in Rahway, NJ.

TNA presents Victory Road tonight from Orlando:

*Sting vs. Jeff Hardy for the TNA title - This is going to be a big test for Hardy because Sting at almost 52 with a lot of injuries is very limited in what he can do. They've hid it well on his return, but this time he's going to have to do a longer match, plus going on last is tough. At least he won't have to directly follow either Kurt Angle or most likely A.J. Styles.

*Rob Van Dam vs. Mr. Anderson for the Lockdown title shot

*Beer Money vs. Ink Inc. for tag titles - An interesting note is that Ink Inc. were still babyfaces on TV on Thursday, but they've worked as heels against Beer Money on the house shows. This should be a good match.

*Matt Hardy vs. A.J. Styles - Big test for Matt because a PPV match with Styles, especially on this show, needs to be good

*Ultimate X with Kazarian vs. Jeremy Buck vs. Max Buck vs. Robbie E for the X title - These matches are usually very good. Just too bad they are going in with zero hype or build.

*Angelina Love & Winter vs. Sarita & Rosita for the Knockouts tag title. Another set of champions who don't get along well.

*Matt Morgan vs. Hernandez in a first blood match. I'm not much of a fan of first blood matches and they usually give meaningless finishes. These two have gotten high marks over the weekend for doing better matches than you'd think.

*Tommy Dreamer vs. Bully Ray. These two are opening and will probably do a brawl. They've got experience in knowing how to get the match story over. Obviously this builds to Ray vs. Devon going forward and this is just a break in that feud.

*Kurt Angle and Jeff Jarrett will probably have a confrontation at the end of several vignettes regarding Karen and Jeff's honeymoon, which will be part of the show.

We'll have live coverage on the site starting at 8 p.m. Eastern time. The show doesn't look bad, but most of the matches are going in with very little build.

Raw is live on Monday night from St. Louis at the Scottrade Center with Trish Stratus returning to Raw to face Vickie Guerrero and if Vickie loses, she must leave Raw, Daniel Bryan defends the U.S. title against Sheamus, and Sheamus loses, he quits something or other, plus Snooki will be the guest host. The dark match is Cena & Orton & HHH as a trio against Miz & Punk & Sheamus with Michael Cole as referee.

Smackdown and NXT are taped on Tuesday in Kansas City at the Sprint Center. We've got two issues out this week of the Wrestling Observer Newsletter. "Perhaps UFC decision makers can do what others in similar roles in other genres have been unable to do and that is manage their own competition as they indicate they want to do." Boy does that bring back memories. Ross felt they have to avoid the urge to promote too many PPV events.

--Monday's Raw was not sold out but all the floor and second deck seats are gone. After WWE had no sold out shows for months with the exception of the Royal Rumble, Raw is on a string of three straight sold out Mondays.

--Erick "Heavy Metal" Casas spent seven hours in jail on Friday after blowing a .45 in a breathalyzer test when he was pulled over weaving lanes and looking suspicious. He was sentenced to 30 hours in jail and will have to set up time to serve his remaining 23 hours. Casas headlines Friday night's Rey de Reyes show in a hair match against Electroshock.
